Dies in Honduras.

Word was received at Charlotte last Wednesday afternoon of the death of Fenn Spaulding, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spaulding of that city, at Honduras, South American. No particulars were received of his death but word had been cabled from that country by a member of the Theta Delta Chi fraternity of the U. of M. to the secretary at Ann Arbor and he wired to Prosecutor R. R. McPeck at Charlotte, who was also a member of the fraternity.

The news came as a great shock to the family and friends as Fenn was a man of magnificent build and had never known what it was to be sick. Since then through Congressman J. M. C. Smith, who took the matter up with the state department at Washington, it has been learned that he died suddenly from an acute attack of indigestion and was buried in that country. An effort has been made, and with success, to have the remains sent home on the first boat though it is the law of that country that no body may be removed under two years time and from that to five years according to the cause of death. Spaulding went to that country in 1910 to look after a mining proposition at Honduras after having been in the west a number of years in mining work.

Memorial services were held at the home of his parents in Charlotte.
