## AIR MAIL

The air mail service is now available for use by all sections of the United States including patrons of the Vermontville Post Office.

The New York—San Francisco route operated by the Post Office Department is divided into three zones; New York to Chicago, Ill., Chicago to Scheyenne, 2. Scheyenne to San Francisco, 3.

For instance, a letter from any point in Michigan address to any point in California would go for 16 cents. Taking the Air Mail at Chicago.

Time—New York to San Francisco—34 hr. 45 Min.

Time—San Francisco to New York,—32 hrs. 5 Min.

## NEW POST OFFICE AT VERMONTVILLE

### CONGRESSMAN WILLIAMS ON THE JOB

#### Vermontville To Have Standard Post Office

After more than a year of negotiation with the Post Office Department, during which time the influence and persuasive efforts of Congressman Williams have been called into action many times, a lease has been negotiated with the Post Office Department whereby complete new Standard Equipment will be installed in present quarters and building placed in proper condition for a Standard Post Office.

Call Boxes of 1880 vintage will be replaced by automatic Key-less locks; wire grating to ceiling will separate work room from Lobby which will remain open evenings and Holidays, giving box holders many added hours of service.

Furniture and fixtures will be of quartered oak through out, in fact Vermontville can boast a Post Office second to none of its size in the State.

Vermontville, is to be congratulated upon the assurance of this improvement and the good work of Congressman Williams in bringing it about, as Standard equipment, as a rule, is authorized only in the larger of the 3rd Class Post Offices.

The present equipment has been in continual service for more than forty years. The world moves, and the entire community will welcome the change.
