Believed Victim of Heart Attack

Diplomat Suffering from Hours in Cold

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Former Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles was found in a semiconscious condition in a suburban Maryland countryside near his estate early Sunday.

Circumstances indicated that he may have suffered a heart attack on an after-midnight walk in sub-freezing weather.

His condition was described as serious because of exposure.

HIS FINGERS and toes were frozen and there is the possibility some may have to be amputated, Dr. George R. Huffman, his physician, said.

Huffman reported that a fur coat Welles was wearing at the time he was found undoubtedly saved him from freezing to death. He was hatless.

Mrs. Welles and his son, Arnold, were at his bedside.

FRIENDS SAID that Welles, now 56, suffered chronically from insomnia and that during the last week he had been deeply upset by the tragic death in New York Dec. 20 of his close friend, Laurence Duggan.

Duggan was killed in a fall or leap from his 16th-floor office window.

He was a former State Department official and protege of Welles.

When, after his death, Duggan's name was linked with the current probe into Communist spy activi-
