On June 7, 1922 he was married in Detroit to Florence E. Wells, formerly of Vermontville. They lived in Detroit and Dearborn until moving to Vermontville in 1959.

Mr. Humphrey was a member for many years of Tyrian Lodge No. 300, F & A M in Detroit.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three sisters and two brothers in England.
