Rev. Ira Calvert Snavely, 88, retired minister, passed away, Thursday, May 14 at the Chelsea Methodist Home at Chelsea, Michigan.

A native of Hudson, Illinois, he was the eighth child of a family of twelve children and his parents were Moses Y. and Sally Snavely.

He entered the ministry at the age of twenty and following his college education he was first pastor of the Kearney Mission in Central Nebraska. He spent the years of 1909 to 1912 in Bethany Bible School while serving as pastor of the church at Naperville, Ill., and spent some months holding Bible Institutes under Bethany's sponsorship, mostly in Washington state and some in Iowa.
