Edwin Eugene Spitzer

Edwin Eugene Spitzer was born in Lowell, Mich., October 22, 1861, and died April 12, 1937. He was married to Mary Jane Carey September 16, 1880 at Charlotte. To this union were born seven children; a daughter, Maude E., who died April 15, 1917, and a son, Edwin C., who died October 25, 1927.

Immediately after their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Spitzer settled on a farm in Vermontville township where they lived 26 years. Thirty years ago they moved to the farm near Charlotte where Mrs. Spitzer now resides.

Mr. Spitzer was of a quiet unassuming nature, but was always interested in the good of his community. His long service on the Fairview school board was appreciatively remembered by the school children who visited the Spitzer home in a body on the day of the funeral. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and was a loyal christian. His whole life was spent working and doing for his family and he found his greatest happiness in his home. He was a devoted husband and father.

He leaves to mourn his loss his widow, four daughters and a son, his grandchildren and one brother Chauncey C. Spitzer of Charlotte and many friends.

Funeral services were held from the residence Thursday at 2:00 p. m., Rev. Mooers officiating with burial at Maple Hill. Friends attended from Battle Creek, Hillsdale, Cedar Springs, Greenville, Lansing, Grand Ledge and Detroit.
