


Above you see George (left) and John Hauser, brothers who have been working for Motor Wheel for a good many years. George, who is 58 years old, first started working for the Gier Pressed Steel Co., in 1919 and John, 57, was first employed by Motor Wheel in 1921. Both men are now employed as die repairmen in the die room at Plant No. 2. The Hauser brothers came to the United States from Germany with their parents in 1882 and have lived in Lansing since that time. Funeral services for Mr. Jay Hawkins were held at the Congregational Church last Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, preceded by a brief service at the home. Rev. James R. Stein conducted the services and preached the sermon. Mrs. Della Welshon sang two hymns: "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again", and was accompanied by Miss Betty Slout. Interment was made in Woodlawn Cemetery.

The pall bearers were the same men who assisted at Mrs. Hawkins' death, viz.: W. J. Sherrard, Arthur Crook, Frank Cook, Pitt Pugh, Jess Baker, and John Konechny.

Jay Hawkins passed from this life at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Lver Snoke, on April 16, 1938, following a short illness, at the age of a little more than 72 years.

He was born March 4, 1866 in Vermontville Township, the fifth child of Horace and Betsey Sprague Hawkins. He was united in marriage to Zoe Lulu Denton on November 25, 1891, and to this union were born two children, Beulah B. and Betsey P. Hawkins. Mr. Hawkins lived all his life in Vermontville Township; for many years he was a farmer, and for the last twenty years a resident of the village. He was a "Life-member" of the Vermontville Odd Fellows Lodge No. 557.

FACTORY EXECUTIVE DIES UNEXPECTEDLY

Charles Sutherland, 42, Motor Wheel Employment Chief Heart Victim

Charles Sutherland, 42, of 1110 East Main street, employment manager of the Motor Wheel corporation, died early Tuesday as the result of a heart attack suffered Monday.

Mr. Sutherland, who had been employment manager of the local industrial concern for the past 15 years, suffered the attack Monday noon at his home where he had gone for lunch. He was given immediate medical aid but died about 2 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Mr. Sutherland was born at Morrice July 6, 1896. Surviving are the widow, Bernice; a daughter, Audrey Jane; the parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Sutherland of Morrice, and three sisters, Mrs. J. Thomas of Owosso, Mrs. L. Thomas of Oxford, and Mrs. Thomas Hagaway of Niles. Funeral arrangements had not been completed Tuesday noon.

Jay Hawkins was reared in a Christian home where the bonds of brotherly love and family loyalty were instilled into his nature so well that they stayed with him throughout his life and were manifested on different occasions.

He leaves to survive him his two daughters and two granddaughters; three brothers, Horace W. of Turon, Kansas, Joseph H. of Battle Creek, and Grant of Vermontville; two sisters, Cornelia Kenworthy of Los Angeles, and Sylvia, now Mrs. Orris Greiner of Vermontville. (One brother and one sister died in infancy.) Besides these he is survived by several nieces, nephews, cousins, and an uncle, Edmund Sprague, and an aunt, Mrs. Gertrude Hawkins both of Vermontville.

His wife, Zoe Hawkins, preceded him in death, having passed to the larger life on December 15, 1937. It was since then that Mr. Hawkins' health gradually failed and he was ready to go.
