

Ex-Owner Of Paper at Olivet Dies

OLIVET — Burrige Smith Tucker, 60, former owner of the Olivet Optic and the Pottsville Press who was associated with other Michigan and Ohio newspapers, died Thursday night at his home, 129 S. Main St., after several months of illness.

A native of Battle Creek, he was the son of Frederick E. S. and Florence Smith Tucker. He graduated from Battle Creek High School and took his first newspaper job with the Battle Creek Enquirer-News.

Tucker attended Olivet College and then entered the advertising side of newspapering in Bryan, Ohio. He joined the advertising staff of the Flint Journal in 1944 and purchased the Olivet newspaper 10 years later.

Following the sale of the Olivet paper two years ago to Glen Waterbury, Tucker joined the Chelsea Evening Standard in Washtenaw County.

At the time of his death, he was advertising manager for the Standard and the Dexter Leader.

Survivors include the widow, Helen; a daughter, Judith Ann, and two sisters, Miss Florence Tucker of San Francisco, and Mrs. Charles Rhodes of Fort-Lauderdale, Fla.

Tucker was a charter member and president of the local Rotary club and a member of Michigan Press Association and the Masonic lodge at Flint. He belonged to the Congregational Church here.

Funeral services will be at 2 o'clock Monday at Burkhead Chapel here with burial in Oak Hill Cemetery, Battle Creek.
