L. D. Bodine was my first dist. superintendent, and the material he began to work with, in my case, was exceedingly green. In times of discouragement, many times a short sentence from him might have sent me back to my former work, but it did not come. He was like a real father to his preachers.

He was a Free Methodist of the original pattern, with a genuine, thorough, up-to-date Christian experience—a genuine saint. His regular quarterly visits to our parsonage, with his wife, always left us with a new awareness of Christ's presence. His firm, gentle manner in performing functions of his office and deep wisdom of his counsel could well be patterned after by any minister. We are poorer because he has left us, yet richer because of his fellowship in days gone by.

Bodine.—Rev. L. D., born in Mich., May 19, 1882, died triumphantly at Mercy hospital, Cadillac, Mich., Jan. 15, 1964, after a 2-year illness. In 1908 he married Matilda Lindberg, who survives, besides a foster son, Charles, and a brother, Rev. G. W. In 1912 he was



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gloriously converted, soon after clearly sanctified. He entered the F. M. ministry in 1914, joining the No. Michigan conf. in 1917, serving until his health failed, pastorates as well as the superintendency, and delegate to General Conference 5 times. Retiring in 1952, he moved to Manton, where one funeral was held, L. W. Gibbs bringing the message. A second service at Sault Ste. Marie, Supt. J. C. Hecoeks in charge, 33 ministers taking part. A strong, clear preacher of the gospel, Brother Bodine wonderfully adorned the ministry of the Word. Both saint and sinner unhesitatingly acknowledged him to be a man of God.
