He was born in Vermontville, a son of Edward Dwight and Frances (Dancer) Barber. His father was a son of Homer G. d ad Barber, a son of Edward Hinng man Barber, who was a native of Benson, Vt., and one of the 13 incorporators of the village east of Vermontville in 1836 kí Succeeded His Father ce

Homer G. Barber, a merchant, organized the private Barber bgn Bank in Vermontville in 1862. In

1907 the institution was incorfe porated as the Barber State he Bank. The son, Edward D., became

president of the bank after his father's death in 1909, and also headed the Eaton County Savin ings Bank in Charlotte, which he was instrumental in organ-T izing. After his death in 1931, SI his son, Philip H., headed both m banking firms.

The two banks were merged at the end of 1954 and in 1959 were acquired by the Michigan ³ National Bank, at which time fin 3 Mr. Barber was named senior, re vice president in charge of the pay Charlotte bank.
