George Clare Sprague, well-known admiralty lawyer and educator, died Saturday, June 11, in Bradenton, Florida, at the age of eighty one.

Mr. Sprague was born in Vermontville June 21, 1884, the eldest son of Ernest E. and EZOA Potter Sprague. He received a B. A. degree from Olivet College in 1905, and subsequently an LLB and PHD degrees from New York University. Olivet College awarded him an honorary LLD degree in 1934. For many he served as a member of the Board of Trustees at Olivet College.

For over 30 years Mr. Sprague was engaged in private law practice in New York City and was special lecturer in Admiralty and Aviation Law at New York University and Columbia University Laws schools. During

World War II he acted as special assistant to the Attorney General for the Department of Justice.

Mr. Sprague was preceded in death by his wife, Laura Selden Sprague, in 1954. He is survived by two brothers, two sisters, and three daughters - Major Elizabeth Sprague, ANC, Fort Polk, Louisiana, Mrs. William Clark, New Castle, Delaware, and Mrs. Leo Tyson, Olivet, Michigan. Also surviving are four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Bradenton Tuesday morning and graveside services and burial in Poultney, Vermont Wednesday.
