VERMONTVILLE, Oct. 1—Roy
E. Mathews, 69, died Saturday
morning at his home, 257 Maple
st. He came here 42 years ago
and operated a grocery store un-
til 1946.

Mathews was elected to the
board of education during the de-
pression and while serving
helped push such school improve-
ments as a new chemistry labora-
tory, kitchen and home econom-
ics room through the national
youth administration.

He was instrumental in provid-
ing free text books for school
children here, but the system
had to be modified later follow-
ing consolidation. He also helped
establish rural school bus trans-
portation for the area.

Surviving are the widow,
Laurel; his mother, Mrs. Lizzie
Mathews of Charlotte; two sis-
ters, Mrs. Clyde Thornell of Char-
lotte and Mrs. Clyde Laesher of
East Lansing; two brothers, Louis
