Olivet Woman's Rites Wednesday

OLIVET, April 4 — Funeral services for Miss Blanche Lignian, 81, for many years owner with her brother, John Lignian, of the Olivet Optic, will be held Wednesday at 2 p. m. at the Burkhead funeral chapel here. She died Monday morning after a long illness in a Battle Creek hospital. Dr. Morris Boucher will officiate and burial will be in the Olivet cemetery.

Born in Howell, daughter of Martin and Emma Frost Lignian. She lived later in Kingsley, Belaire and Traverse City. A graduate of the University of Michigan, she taught school in Battle Creek and later was on the editorial staff of the Battle Creek Moon Journal and Enquirer-News. The family moved to Olivet in 1913 when the Optic was purchased.

Miss Lignian was the first woman delegate to the Eaton county Republican convention. She was for two years president of the Eaton County Federation of Women's Clubs, and active in the Olivet branch, the Kedronite club. She was affiliated with the D. A. R., the women's auxiliary board of Olivet college and the Congregational church.

She is survived by a sister, Miss Mabel Lignian, and her sister-in-law, Mrs. John Lignian, both of Olivet.
