Committee on Senate Business

Rule 28. All nominations for business, shall be reported upon by such committee, the vote on the such nomination being voted upon until it shall (except nominations of session without reference) unless a majority of the favor of an executive committee. It shall require the votes of Senators-elect to confirm any nomination to office submitted to the Senate.

When, upon the sine die adjournment of any session of the Senate, a nomination submitted by the Governor has not been reported to the committee on Senate Business, such action shall be tantamount to a nomination by the Senate.

Propositions for Expenditures

Rule 29. No motion or resolution calling for an appropriation of money shall be acted upon by the Senate without first having been reported to an appropriate committee for its consideration and recommendation.

Reference of Bills

Rule 30. (a) Each bill, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, shall be referred to the proper standing committee by the Senate. That the Senate may, on motion made before adjournment on any day, or the next legislative day at which a quorum is present, refer any bill to any committee other than the one to which it was referred at the time of its introduction.

(b) All bills favorably reported back to the Senate shall be considered by the Committee of the Whole with the amendments proposed by the committee, which amendments shall be first considered by the Committee of the Whole: Provided, That every bill appropriating money, when reported back to the Senate favorably by another committee, shall, together with the amendments that may be proposed thereto by the committee, be referred to the Committee on Appropriations for consideration; and, when favorably reported back to the Senate by said committee
