Mr. Wolf was the manager of
the Farm Electrical co-op in Port-
land since it was founded in 1936.
He died Sunday in a Tucson, Ariz.,
hospital.

He had gone to Arizona last
month because of his health.

Surviving are his widow, Cora;
two daughters, Mrs. Jerry Krupp,
Grand Ledge, and Mrs. John Over-
house, East Lansing and five
grandchildren.

Anna Jane Ford was born in
Woodland twp. February 10th 1877
to Joseph and Magdalena Ford. At
the age of ten years the family mov-
ed to Vermontville. When she was
14 the family lost their father and
moved to Hayden, Colorado where
she lived for two years.

After her return to Michigan she
was married to Charles E. Surine of
Vermontville on March 14th, 1900
where they lived on a farm on Irish
Street West of Vermontville until
they retired, built a home in Ver-
montville where they resided at the
time of her death March 28, 1954
at the age of 77 years, one month
and 10 days.

She is survived by the husband,
Charles E. Surine, one daughter,
Mrs. Freida Tubbs, both of Vermont-
ville, one son, Merle E. Surine of
Kalamazoo, five grandchildren, five
sisters, Mrs. Ella Magden of Eugene
Oregon; Mrs. Catharine Pifer of

Hayden, Colorado; Mrs. Marie Ed-
ington of Marysville, California who
has been helping care for her sister

Mrs. Surine was a Life Member of

Crash Kills Barry Man

D. B. Mote, 86, Is Victim Near Middleville

Hastings—David B. Mote, 86, of
Lake Odessa, was killed outright
late Tuesday afternoon when his
auto collided with one driven by
Harold Russell, 38, of Nashville,
at Yankee Springs rd. and M37,
two miles south of Middleville,
Barry county Sheriff Clarence
Donovan said.

Dr. Wilbur Burk, coroner, said
Mr. Mote suffered a slight skull
fracture and a brain injury.

Russell was thrown from his
car. He suffered multiple head and
body bruises, a left shoulder in-
jury and shock. He was reported
in fair condition at Pennock hos-
pital, Hastings.

Archie Guy, 41, of Vermontville, 1.
a passenger in the Russell car, suf-
fered a left side injury and possible
internal injuries. His condition was
also given as fair.

Mr. Mote is survived by his
wife, Mary; two sons, Dr. Clarence
Mote of Royal Oak and Kenneth
of El Segundo, Calif., and a daugh-
ter, Mrs. Mary McKimmey of
Daverton.

The body is at Pickens funeral
chapel, Lake Odessa.
