Mrs. E. J. Loveland, a life long resident of Vermontville passed away at her home on west Main St. at 1:30 p. m. Saturday afternoon following a two months illness caused by a fall from which she never recovered.

Zella D. Loveland was born at Vermontville June 20th 1880, a daughter of Frank E. and Etta L. Ambrose, and departed this life July 17th, 1954 at the age of 74 years.

On June 27 1906 she was married to E. J. Loveland, to which union two daughters were born. Surviving besides the husband are the daughters, Dorothy Gutches and Vera Berry, both of Battle Creek, a sister Vera Gregg of Battle lotte and six grandchildren besides many other relatives and friends. Ill health kept her closely confined to her home for many years where she was a devoted wife and mother, always keenly interested in her family and friends.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 p. m. at the Congregational church where she was a life long member. Rev. St. Clare Parsons of Greenville officiating, assisted by our new pastor Rev. F Willard Kime.

Funeral Services For Donald Seitz Held Saturday

Services were conducted Saturday at 1:30 p.m. at the Otto Funeral chapel in Vermontville for Donald B. Seitz, 42. Rev. Arthur H. Underwood, of Charlotte, officiated, and burial was in Woodlawn cemetery near Vermontville.

Donald "Tommy" Seitz, garage owner and mechanic of Vermontville where he had owned his own business since World War II, died Thursday of a wound from a 20-gauge single barrel shotgun. He had driven his car onto a lane off the Center road about a mile east of Hastings.

Herbert Bolter, an employee at the E. W. Bliss company, spotted the car in the lane as he was going to work Thursday morning, and after he stopped to investigate, continued on into Hastings where the matter was reported to Sheriff Clarence Donovan.

Coroner Daniel Clarke, M.D., said death occurred about 1 or 1:30 a.m.

Donald B. Seitz was born in Vermontville on March 24, 1913. He was a son of Frank and Sarah (Duel) Seitz. On Aug. 17, 1939 he was married to Eloise Hadden in Indiana.

He is survived by his wife; one daughter, Connie, a freshman in the Vermontville high school; his father, Frank Seitz, and one brother, Keith, who both reside on a farm northeast of Vermontville.
