**A. R. Lovell, 74, Passes
in Arkansas**

Vermontville—Arby R. Lovell, 74, former Vermontville village president and businessman, died Wednesday at a Corning, Ark., hospital.

A native of Ohio, Mr. Lovell came to Michigan at 18 months with his family in a covered wagon.

He was owner and operator of a local implement firm from the early 1930s until 1952, when he retired and sold the business to a son. He served as village president several terms beginning in 1942.

Surviving are his wife, Minnie, with whom he celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in September, 1952; two sons, Gordon of Vermontville and Ellis of Dearborn; a daughter, Mrs. Harry Wright of Pottersville; four sisters, Mrs. Fred Clay of Charlotte, Mrs. Ray Welch and Mrs. Pearl Van Buren of Sunfield and Mrs. Charles Collier of Vermontville and six grandchildren.
