

Shafer Dies; In Congress Since 1937

Battle Creek Lawmaker Was Sharp Critic of Inefficiency

Washington—(P)—Rep. Paul W. Shafer (R-Mich.), a veteran of 18 years in the house of representatives, died Tuesday in Walter Reed hospital.

The 61-year-old representative from Michigan's Third congressional district died after complications set in following surgery Friday. The operation was performed to correct a liver condition.

Renominated Aug. 3.

Shafer, a member of the house armed services committee, died six weeks after the death of his wife in Battle Creek, Mich., July 5. On Aug. 3 he had been renominated for a tenth term in office. He was first elected to congress in 1936. The term began in January, 1937 and Shafer had been a member of the house since that time.

Following his renomination, Shafer entered Washington's Bethesda hospital for a routine physical. He had been undergoing periodical checkups since 1940 when he suffered serious back injuries in an auto accident.

Shafer, onetime newspaperman, was a sharp critic of what he believed to be army waste and inefficiency.

Shafer was born in Elkhart, Ind. He entered the newspaper field with his late brother, Chet. The two men published newspapers from the date of tin Elkhart and at Battle Creek and Bronson, Mich.
