Henry "Toot" Hall Dies at Age, 75



"Toot" Hall, Henry B. Olivet College football coach, ardent hunter, and proprietor with his brother of a large farm in Bellevue sist of sheets in such form and having Township, died at 8 p. m. Friday iri. his farm home. He had been in ill health most of last summer and con-with fined to his house several weeks before his final illness.

He was 75 years old, having been it the born Aug. 1, 1879, in Bellevue Town- req ship, on the old homestead which has been in the family for 115 years. His parents were Henry B. and Maria Jane (Ringer) Hall.

After high school at Bellevue, he went to Olivet College from 1899 to 1901, afterward coaching football 1901-03, 1908-10, and in 1912. Those were the days when Michigan Agricultural College teams, now the Mighty MSC Spartans, were trounced to or tied regularly by the Olivet Crimsons.

From coaching, Mr. Hall turned to the hardware business in Olivet for 10 years, then back to the farm with his brother, Daniel. Although farming was his occupation until his death, he enjoyed following the football fortunes of both Olivet and Bellevue through the years, and was one of a nucleus of the fox hunting and racoon hunting fraternity in this area.

He was honored Oct. 21, 1950, at the Olivet College Homecoming, the Saturday game being played on "Toot Hall-Day."

It was on Nov. 12, 1907, that he married the former Fannie Green, a member of one of Olivet's pioneer families. She died in 1943.

Surviving besides his brother are two daughters, Mrs. Eugene (Betsy) Poyer of Bellevue and Mrs. Harold (Helen) Wetherell of Belleville; and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Oct. 18 from the Bellevue Baptist church. s fo Dr. Raymond B. Blakney, president of Olivet College, officiated. The pallbearers were E. A. Mahoney, Forest Bradley, Gilford Leeser, Arthur Smith William Brown and Ralph Keith.

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Burial was in Riverside Cemetery, divi Bellevue.
