R. A. Paul Dead at 58 MICHIGAN

Auto Parts Firm Founder sing, June 3, ar Succumbs Tuesday at Charlevoix

Robert A. Paul, 58, founder of Paul Automotive, Inc., died Tuesday at Charlevoix, apparently the victim of a heart attack.

Paul, who lived in Lansing for 25 years, had been living at Charlevoix for the past five years, and was working on his yacht when stricken. He sold his interest in the Lansing auto parts firm about 10 years ago, and was retired at the time of his death.

Surviving are the widow, Maree; a niece, Miss Margaret Bresnan, a student nurse at Edward W. Sparrow hospital; two nephews, Dun-can Mac Lachlan of New York and Burton Mac Lachlan of Detroit; a sister, Mrs. Walter G. Berpard of Grosse Pointe, and a brother, Fred Paul of Strathroy, Ont.

Funeral services have been ten-tatively set for Thursday at 2 p. m. at the Contius chapel in Char-levoix, with Rev. Harold Kohn, officiating. Burial services will be held Friday at Wyoming, Ont., where Mr. Paul was born Feb. 28, 1896.

The delegates to the convention were elected May 6, 1850, in pursuance of Act No. 78 of the laws of 1850. The constitution as revised by the convention was submitted to the people November 5, 1850, and adopted by a majority of 26,736 votes.
