Ray Welch, Local Businessman Taken by Death New Year's Day

Taken with a heart attack on New Year's day, Ray Welch of 103 Jackson street, passed away at his home Saturday evening, January 1st., at the age of 65. He was a life time resident of the Sunfield area and operated the Welch Hardware and Implement store for 34 years.

Ray Welch, the son of Perry and Lucy Welch, was born October 26, 1889 in Sunfield township. On May 18, 1911 he married Myrtie Lovell.

Mr. Welch was a captain in the Sunfield fire department at the time of his death and at one time had served as chief of the department. He also served a number of years as a member of the village council and was a member of the Sunfield Lion's club. At one time he operated an automobile agency here.

Surviving besides the widow, Myrtie; one son, Perry, of Sunfield; two daughters, Mrs. Lois Willson, Sunfield, and Mrs. Eu-
