
Left alone, with a business to which he could only devote part of his time, Mr. Bunday gave up his mail clerk job and decided to concentrate on production of mattresses.

Things soon began looking up, and as markets were found in Detroit and Chicago, Mr. Bunday launched on the construction of a plant in St. Johns.

Then, in 1905, the plant was wiped out by a fire.
