To Dr. Jesse F. Harrold the loss is a deep personal one. Mrs. Beadle did everything possible for her patients not only in a medical sense but in caring for their personal needs as well.

One of the dozens of stories that are told about Mrs. Beadle occurred when she refused to transfer three welfare patients from her home.

The lack of funds had forced the welfare department to transfer patients to homes where care was cheaper. Mrs. Beadle cared for the three patients for more than a year without charge rather than turn a deaf ear to their pleas to stay.

The nation heard about her in 1948 when Tom Breneman, producer of the famous "Breakfast Club" radio program, sent her one of his orchids for being a "good neighbor".

Mrs. Beadle had been in poor health since last May. She had been bed-ridden for a month prior to her death.

She was born in West Windsor township, June 21, 1881. Her husband, Lina C., a former employe of the Motor Wheel corporation, died last November.

Mrs. Beadle was a member of the Royal Neighbors, Michigan Nursing Home association, and the Lansing Practical Nurses' association.

Surviving are her two sons, H. G. and John A., both of Lansing; a daughter, Mrs. John Withrow, East Lansing; 10 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Burial will be in the Mount Rest cemetery, St. Johns, beside her husband.

F. N. Arbaugh Is Dead at 82; Civic Leader

F. N. Arbaugh, 82, pioneer Lansing merchant, died about 9 p. m. Saturday at his home at 439 S. Verlinden ave.

Mr. Arbaugh, the oldest living ex-president of the Lansing Chamber of Commerce, was the founder of the F. N. Arbaugh company and had served in recent years as chairman of the board of directors.

A native of Johnstown, Pa., Mr. Arbaugh spent his youth on a farm in Westmoreland county, Pa., and moved to Indiana, Pa., where he graduated from Indiana State Normal school in 1893.

He came to Lansing in 1896 and became clerk in the small dry goods store of J. M. Cameron. He later bought into the company and in 1906 the company was incorporated as the F. N. Arbaugh company.

Active in many of the city's pioneer businesses, he also was a charter member of Rotary club. He participated in many Community Chest endeavors and was a leader in the development of the Merchants' division of the Chamber of Commerce.

HOMER O. PIERCE DIED SATURDAY

Homer O. Pierce, 83, retired poultry dealer, passed away at his home on route 3 at midnight Saturday.

A native of Portland he owned and operated a poultry business in Woodbury for 44 years before retiring in 1937.
