Dies Here**

**Dr. Karl Brucker Active  
In Theatrical and  
Lions Club Work**

Dr. Karl B. Brucker, long a leader in Civic Player Guild productions and work of the Lions club for the blind, collapsed at his home, 610 S. Walnut st., and died late Monday at St. Lawrence hospital. He was 72.

Death of Dr. Brucker, who had retired four years ago after 45 years of medical practice, was believed due to a heart attack.

Born in South Lyons, July 27, 1884, he came here early in life, attended high school and Michigan State and obtained his medical degree at the University of Michigan.

For a number of years, Dr. Brucker was associated with his father, the late Dr. C. H. Brucker, in medical practice. He was a fellow in the American Proctological society.

**PLAYED MANY LEADS**

Devoting much time to civic affairs, his interests mainly were in the Lions club and the Civic Players organization. He was a charter member of the Lions club, one of its past presidents and helped with its work with blind boys and girls.

His interest in amateur theatricals was directed toward the Civic Players, with which he was associated about a quarter of a century. He was a past president of the local theater group. His acting talents earned him many lead and top supporting roles in its productions.

Dr. Brucker also took a keen interest in the Downtown Coaches club, of which he was a member. He also was affiliated with Central Methodist church, Capitol Lodge No. 66 (life member), A. & F. M., Lansing Lodge No. 196, B. P. O. Elks, and Ingham County Medical society.
