Dr. Way, for the most part, lived in quiet retirement for the last 12 years, although occasionally he filled pulpits in the Kalamazoo area as guest minister in emergencies.

Services were conducted at 1 Tuesday at the First Methodist Church with Drs. Thomas M. Pryor and Richard W. Wearne officiating. Interment was in Riverside Cemetery at Albion.

DR. MARIE RASEY

Nashville, and indeed the rest of the world, lost a truly great woman with the death of Dr. Marie Rasey, last Thursday.

Dr. Rasey, who was born in Nashville 70 years ago, was known throughout the world for her understanding work in the field of child psychology. She leaves the world a better place for her having lived here. The most outstanding monuments to her dedicated life are the many formerly disturbed children whom she helped.

Dr. Rasey, who was the daughter of a Nashville barber, worked hard to go from high school here to the University of Michigan. She was among the first of the girls from Nashville to go to college.

A three week vacation in England was interrupted when she first became ill and she flew back to Detroit and entered Henry Ford Hospital on August 16. It was there that she died of cancer.

Dr. Rasey, who never married, had no close survivors.
