DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN STATE POLICE.

Act 59, P. A. 1935, creates and establishes the state department of Michigan state police, which consists of a commissioner as its executive head and of such officers and employes as may be appointed or employed in such department. The commissioner is appointed by the governor and holds office during good behavior. The commissioner may be removed from office upon the filing with the supreme court of a petition charging misfeasance, malfeasance or nonfeasance in office. All persons appointed as officers shall execute the constitutional oath of office before entering upon their duties. No officer shall be dismissed, except when insufficient funds require a reduction in expenditures in which case the officer or officers junior in point of service shall be discharged, until a due hearing on his
