

Woman Active In Lodges Dies

Nashville Resident Also
Leader in Civic Work

VERMONTVILLE, May 15 — Mrs. Emily E. Wilson, well-known here in church and school activities, died early Thursday morning at the home of her son, George Hubert Wilson, in Nashville after a long illness.

She had been a lifelong resident of Eaton county except four years in Onondaga.

She was a member of the Kalamo and Vermontville Methodist churches, past president of the Vermontville school board, past president of the Albion district Women's Missionary society, past commander of the Maccabee lodge of Vermontville, past master of the Vermontville Grange and was a member of the Vermontville Women's club.

Survivors besides the son, George Hubert, are one other son, Fred Allen Wilson of Vermontville and two brothers, Rev. Henry A. Lyon of Grand Rapids and Tylee W. Lyon of Battle Creek.

The body was taken to the Otto funeral home in Vermontville where it will remain until Saturday morning and then be taken to the Vermontville Methodist church for funeral services at 2 o'clock, with Rev. Howard Lindsay officiating.

Burial will be in Kalamo cemetery.

DEPARTMENT OF MICHIGAN STATE POLICE.

OSCAR G. OLANDER, East Lansing Commissioner

Act 59, P. A. 1935, creates and establishes the state department of Michigan state police, which consists of a commissioner as its executive head and of such officers and employees as may be appointed or employed in such department. The commissioner is appointed by the governor and holds office during good behavior. The commissioner may be removed from office upon the filing with the supreme court of a petition charging misfeasance, malfeasance or nonfeasance in office. All persons appointed as officers shall execute the constitutional oath of office before entering upon their duties. No officer shall be dismissed, except when insufficient funds require a reduction in expenditures in which case the officer or officers junior in point of service shall be discharged, until a due hearing on his
