President's Brother Dies

KANSAS CITY, Mo.— (AP) — Arthur Eisenhower, the President's eldest brother and forerunner for a subsequent pattern of family success, died last night of a heart attack at 71.

The former banking executive had been in failing health for almost a year, but his death was unexpected. He had not complained of feeling ill when, shortly after 6:30 p.m. (CST), he collapsed in the bathroom of his suburban home. Friends said Eisenhower had planned to fly to New York today.

James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said in Washington the President was awaiting word from his brother's family regarding funeral plans. Hagerty added there would be no announcement regarding the President attending the services until that word had been received.
