

Ex-Charlotte Druggist Dies in Toledo Hosp.

Boyden T. Moyer, 89, former Charlotte druggist and resident of this area most of his life, died Monday, Feb. 17, in a Toledo, Ohio, hospital after an illness of 10 days.

He was born on April 4, 1868 in Chester township, the son of W. I. and Lydia Allen Moyer. He had been a resident all his life up to five years ago when he moved to Toledo.

Mr. Moyer served as county clerk from 1902 to 1908, was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the First Congregational church. On October 4, 1894, he was married to Blanche Harmon, who died on Dec. 7, 1927. He later married Margery Chandler on April 27, 1930, who passed away on April 11, 1953.

He was living with a daughter, Mrs. Gladys Mikesell, in Toledo, when he became ill. In addition to the daughter, he is survived by a granddaughter, Mrs. George S. Wade, also of Toledo; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Clyde Thrasher of Ann Arbor and Mrs. Elliott Rice of Cranston, Rhode Island; and one step-son, Dr. Edward Chandler of Battle Creek.

Funeral services were held at the Burkhead-Cheney chapel at 10:30 a.m. with burial in Maple Hill cemetery.
