Former Secretary of State Historical Commission Ill Since November

Dr. George Newman Fuller, 83, who served for 30 years as secretary of the Michigan historical commission and editor of its quarterly magazine, died at his home at 1507 S. Genesee dr., Friday morning.

Active in historical circles after his retirement in 1946 until late last year, Dr. Fuller had been ill since last November.

Private funeral services will be held Monday at the Woodmere crematory in Detroit. The Estes-Leadley funeral home is in charge of the arrangements.

TWO DAUGHTERS SURVIVE

Survivors include two daughters, Miss Florence B. Fuller, a teacher at J. W. Sexton high school, and Mrs. Robert W. Smith of Flint, and three grandchildren.

Dr. Fuller was secretary of the historical commission from 1916 until 1946. He was instrumental in moving the commission's museum from the old Lewis Cass state office building to its present site in the former Turner home on N. Washington ave.

He was born in Barry county Nov. 17, 1873, the son of Dr. Reuben and Delia Fuller and was graduated from high schools in Elkader, Iowa, and Grand Rapids, the latter in 1894.

He served for four years as principal of the public school at L'Anse and for two years as principal of the public school at Nashville.

RECEIVED PH.D DEGREE

Later he received his A. B. degree from the University of Michigan, his master's degree from Harvard university, studied at Yale university and received his Ph. D. degree from the U. of M. in 1912.

He was a consultant for The State Journal's Centennial edition in 1955.

He served as head of the history department, Montana State Normal college, and was an instructor at the University of Michigan immediately before joining the historical commission staff. Actually, he helped to organize the commission itself, beginning in 1915.

Dr. Fuller, essentially a scholar, has written and edited numerous historical papers. In 1925, he wrote "Michigan in the World

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
