

1. Mr. & Mrs. Leroy Wion, 287 S. Main Street own the home formerly owned by the Vance Barbers. This home has been recently remodelled and decorated by the Wions. There will be Maple Sugar available and a patriotic theme will be carried out.
2. Steve Stanton owns the former Sprague home at 372 S. Main and has very cleverly remodelled and decorated it to suit his needs. Steve has a large collection of antique music boxes in his home.
3. The home of Mr. & Mrs. Kenyon Peabody, 125 West Main, was built in 1850 by Rev. W. U. Benedict, the second minister of the Congregational Church. Of special interest is a mural painted in 1890 by Rev. W. U. Benedicts daughter, Sarah Williams, on an upstairs bedroom wall. Mrs. Ethol Figg's quilts will be featured and a Christmas decorating theme will be carried out.
4. Mr. & Mrs. Stan Trumble, 133 West Main, home was built in 1928 by Keith Barber. It is a large New England style home situated on an acre of beautiful land. Stan and Mary Trumble purchased the house in 1972 and have restored and remodelled it.
5. The home of Mr. & Mrs. Jack Wallace, 310 West Main, is one of the larger older homes in Vermontville. The home has many features of interest to the antique buff. The house was built by Homer S. Barber in about 1890.

6. Mr. & Mrs. Cleo Prescott farm on 316 East Main Street was built in 1861 on 60 acres of land within the village. The front quarter of the house was destroyed in 1947 by fire and was rebuilt of its present condition. Today, 13 acres remains of the original 60 purchased in 1861. In the family room a large field stone fireplace was erected in 1971 then the rear quarter of the house was remodelled. A large portion of the stones were taken from the foundation of the 100 year old Bismark Church on Bismark Highway. In 1875, Mr. Prescott's great-grandfather was Sunday School Superintendent of the Bismark Church. The farm has been owned by the Prescott family for 30 years.
7. Mr. & Mrs. Greg Hoefler live at 174 East First Street. They have an old home remodeled by the Hoefler's. They will feature a fall theme. You will be delighted with the unique ideas of decorating and remodeling and possibly pick up some hints for your own use.
8. METHODIST CHURCH - The original church was built in 1862 two miles northeast of Vermontville, and fifteen years later moved to the place where it now stands. The Methodist sanctuary will be decorated for a wedding courtesy of Viola's Flowers and Gifts, Lake Odessa.
9. CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH - The Congregational Church in Vermontville was organized in 1838 and the present building erected in 1862. This church will be decorated for a wedding, courtesy of Viola Cunningham of Viola's Flowers and Gifts, Lake Odessa.
